Hudson River Presbytery: www.hudrivpres.org How are y'all doing on my international trip stories? I know I talk about those days a lot. I am very thankful that you sent me. Here's another one: a greatest day I have ever known, I woke up in Barcelona in the home of a dearest human who has been a part of some of my other best days. I walked through his brilliant neighborhood to a train that quickly led to a small, bright vellow cable car. Below us was a magnificent mountain that seemed to jump out of an otherwise flat land. An eagle-eyed person in the car spotted a goat on a rocky cliff. The mountain was shrouded in fog, but in a gift, before darkness and before departure, the ceiling would lift to reveal a mountaintop that was said to have been carved out by angels with little saws. I cannot confirm that origin story, yet I can see what makes sense about it in the rare beauty. I was inspired also by the rhythms of this place, for as humans partnered with God here, they have set an abbey with a little more than 80 monks calling it home. It is Monserrat. With the clouds holding in the sounds, the glassy surfaces of stone shining with a thin rain, there is nothing like the giant bells on the rooftop that rang at appointed times throughout the day in a fabulous set of tones. These bells marked the times of prayer of the day. These prayers make the daily office. There are many iterations. In the rule of St. Benedict followed in this place and many others, there are eight per day. Beginning at midnight, the next follows at 3am, and so on. I was as inspired as I have ever been. I took some risk and shouldered some quite cold air to stay for a second performance of the famed Boys' Choir of this place. You will be glad to know that my inspiration from the place does not include inviting any of us to pray at midnight daily, or even three in the morning. Rather, how about three other times, perhaps more reasonable, each day from April 11-16? You may join me for all or some. You may be at the church with me or on Facebook (live or later when you are able).

These services are not like our Sundays, they are shorter, they include some things similar and some ways of worship a little different. The goal is to glimpse the life where other things fall away for prayer. Where we do not wait until one gets focused in worship a few Sunday mornings a month, and have that worship set fade an hour or a few into Sunday afternoon. Rather, for those who participate in these days of the daily office, it is never too long between times of quiet, times for God. We'll worship these days at 7am, noon, and 8pm. We'll keep this going on Wednesdays throughout Easter, a 50day season with the last being June 1 preceding Pentecost. I am certain there will be beauty in these worships and these days. Tell me if you are looking for more beauty and want a partner in the searching.

There is nothing God wants to be in your way, and we can find paths together.

NUTRITION

Tips and a great recipe

I recently read a great article about shopping and menu planning during this time of high prices. Obviously, it had a great emphasis on menu planning, coupon collecting and no impulse buying. I think we've all heard that so many times so I won't elaborate further.

My take away was the information about the pantry and what it may contain; not only from the dry storage but making use of the freezer too. Briefly, if something was on sale, i.e. frozen corn, pick up an extra bag.

Another interesting thing was buying frozen vegetables over fresh as the frozen lasted longer. The way that they are now processed from farm to freezer had them retaining the nutrients. Because of the processing of canned vegetables those nutrients leach out in the liquid in the can. Exception is that of tomatoes since we use that liquid in the cooking. I will admit I prefer fresh veggies but do fall back to frozen and have used canned in certain recipes. Always be aware of the salt content in canned vegetables although they do make low sodium now. So I use them all.

The pantry depends on the amount of storage available. I'm very lucky since during one of my husband's renovation projects, (while I was in Florida), was to make me a large storage area. I've learned how to shop to keep it well stocked. Extra mayo, mustard, ketchup and tuna can be found there always careful to look at expiration dates rotating accordingly. I have gallon jars with tight fitting lids for flour and sugar. Stored with that are brown sugar, baking powder and baking soda and yeast packets. Found also is bottled water, and both vegetable oil and EVOO, a small variety of cake mixes, brownie mixes and quick breads. And an emergency can or two of frosting is with them.

A large variety of pasta is also stored there. Any pasta plus a protein and binder can have a meal on the table in a very short time. Whether it be a tomato or cream sauce or even a can of cream soup a casserole or a pasta with meat sauce provides a quick and inexpensive meal. It can even provide leftovers for a second meal. That's called a winwin!

I found a great dessert recipe in the paper and I wanted to share it with you all. With Easter Holiday this month and a family meal to prepare this dessert recipe would be perfect. It's a mini lemon cake with lemon cream cheese frosting. Refreshing, easy and make ahead --- how good is that.

Now if you have a mini Bundt cake pan that's wonderful. If not, use a cupcake pan. Either would work. Baking time would be almost the same. I'd start checking after 15 minutes but normal time would be 17 to 18 minutes at 350-degree oven.

Mini Lemon Cakes

Yield 24 cupcakes, bake 350 for 15 to 18 minutes

c. granulated sugar
 Zest of 1 lemon (about 1 T.)
 ½ c. butter (1 stick)
 2 large eggs, room temp.
 ½ tsp. salt

1 tsp. baking powder 1 ¼ c. flour ½ c. milk, take the chill off in microwave or sit out for an hour.

In large mixing bowl rub the sugar and lemon zest together. Using your mixer add the butter and beat until light and fluffy, about 3 minutes. Add the eggs, one at a time beating well after each addition. Scrape bowl as needed. Combine in separate bowl flour, salt and baking powder. Add alternately with the milk beating well after each addition. Using an ice cream scoop or measuring drop batter into prepared baking pans. (I'd use cupcake papers in cupcake pan) Bake. Remove from oven and spoon over each cake about ½ to 1 tsp. of lemon syrup made while cupcakes are baking. Take ½ c. sugar and the juice from 2 lemons (1/4 cup) and heat over low heat until sugar is dissolved. Cool completely. Then frost with lemon cream cheese frosting.

Cream Cheese Frosting

4 oz. package cream cheese at room temp. NO low fat or reduced fat

1 ¹/₂ T. lemon juice

1 T. heavy cream (can sub. milk or ¹/₂ and ¹/₂) ¹/₄ tsp. salt

4 c. confectioners' sugar (1 pound)

Beat first 4 ingredients until smooth and creamy. Add sugar 1 cup at a time. Adjust final consistency as needed. (Add more sugar or milk). Frost the mini cupcakes and wait for the compliments. Store in refrigerator.

Whether you're cooking or invited to someone's home for dinner these are a great dessert to have. I think you'd could always use a white, yellow or lemon cake mix and add lemon juice as part of the water and zest of that lemon too if you didn't want a scratch cake. In any case..... happy cooking.....
