# New Year, New You

I'll be honest here! Had not the slightest idea what issues I was going to address at the beginning of the new year. So I went to the church's web site and reviewed every January newsletter article I've written since the beginning. I discovered I've covered ALL the usual topics related to weight loss, changing eating habits and everything else in between. That leaves me nothing new. But wait there must be something and right you are.

For as long as the Woman's Association has been doing foods at the rummage sale or Christmas Bazaar events there has always been something that everyone says....that's good! I want the recipe. So once again we have to thank Susan Newland for forwarding her husband, Russ's recipe for Shrimp Jambalaya. Russ adapted this recipe from Todd-Michael St. Pierre. For the church's version he did not use the shrimp. However one could easily add cubed chicken, sausage and any variety of fish you wish. As I always say, make it your own.

# Sassy Shrimp Jambalaya

Serves 4 to 6

3 T. oil or butter
1 medium onion chopped
½ c. red bell pepper
¾ c. chopped celery
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 16oz can stewed tomatoes
¾ c. tomato paste
1 tsp. Tabasco
1 ½ c. cooked shrimp, deveined
1 ½ c. cubed ham
½ c. green onion tops
2 c. cooked rice

Heat oil in heavy saucepan. Cook onion, celery, garlic and pepper until wilted. Add tomatoes and tomato paste. Season to taste with salt, pepper and cayenne, stirring well. Cover and bring to boil. Reduce heat and cook for 20 minutes. Add shrimp, ham, onion tops and rice and cook until hot. Serve and wait for the compliments for they will come. Add green salad and/or perhaps side dish of okra sprinkled with vinegar and you are set. This dish is very good as a leftover too. I also see no reason it can't be made in a crockpot cooking for 4-5 hours then adding the shrimp etc. to heat through. Think about New Year's Day or football playoffs.

### Tips

- Need to halve a recipe that calls for an odd number of eggs? Solution: beat the 1 egg needed to be split, measure and use ½ half in mix. Save the remainder for scrambled eggs in the morning or freeze for later use.
- Out of eggs. Can replace 1 egg with any of the following. \( \frac{1}{4} \) cup of applesauce, oil or mashed banana.
- Coat chocolate chips in flour to prevent them from sinking to the bottom.
- Put bread slices on the cut ends of a sliced cake to keep it fresh.
- Use a hair dryer (carefully) to run across the icing on a cake to give it a glossy finish.
- Make edible cookie bowls for ice cream. Simply use cookie packet, any flavor, and press into muffin tin. Bake, cool for a few minutes and remove from tin. Great for children's party.
- Add a few instant potato flakes to soups and sauces that are too thin. It's a great thickener.

- Need chocolate syrup fast and you forgot to buy it. Well make your own for pennies and you know what's in it. Try this copycat recipe for Hershey Chocolate Syrup. ¾ c. cocoa powder, 1¼ c. water, 1½ c. sugar, 1½ tsp vanilla and dash of salt. Put everything except vanilla in heavy saucepan. Bring to boil and maintain that boil for 1-2 min. stirring constantly. Remove from heat adding the vanilla. It will be thin and watery. Be patient. Allow to cool and as it does it will thicken to the syrup consistency you are looking for. This makes 2 cups and will keep in refrigerator for several weeks. Store in mason jar.
- Instead of paying up to 5 dollars for bread dipping spices make your own and store in dark place like your cabinet. Take out as needed. No need to worry about burning the bread for dinner any longer. This hack comes from Carraba's and is delicious. Everything is 1 tsp...take crushed red pepper, black pepper, oregano, rosemary, basil, parsley, granulated garlic, salt. Mix together and store. Double or triple if desired. When ready to use, mince 1 tsp. fresh garlic and mix into 2 ½ Tablespoons of spice mix. Put on plate and pour ¼ c. olive oil over and begin dipping.

# **Report of Pastoral Search Committee**

We understand that there has been much interest in the activities of the Pastoral Search Committee this past year. By design much of our activities were kept confidential. However, in the interest of transparency and open communication, we hope this will summarize our behind the scenes work and explain why this process has taken as long as it has.

This process has been long and much more complicated than we realized at the outset. First, we recognized the need for feedback from the congregation to help guide us in the process. That is why we started out with our survey and we send our thanks to all who participated. If anyone is interested in a summary of the survey results, please let either Doug Hart or Amanda Zick know. If there is enough interest, we can also submit the survey summary for next month's newsletter.

From there, we discussed the particulars of the position and the search process with the Hudson River Presbytery. We decided that we would be looking for a part time (30 hours/week) Pastor and we would hire someone as a Stated Supply Pastor for a Designated Term of 1 Year. This is the same arrangement that we had with Pastor Carol. Based on discussion with Rev. Martin of the Presbytery, we decided to pursue a national search rather than strictly local to try and give us the largest pool of candidates to choose from, and to find someone that we felt best suited to guide us during this time of transition. Next, we worked with the Session to draft a salary and benefits proposal. We also reached out several times to the Ancramdale church both directly and through Rev. Martin from the Presbytery to see if they wanted to join us in the process and partner together to find a new Pastor. Without a response from them, we pushed forward on our own.

We spent quite a bit of time compiling our Ministry information form, using the survey results to guide our answers to the Presbytery's questions. This is what was used as the "job posting" in the Church Leadership Connection system. Once posted, we were referred 20 candidates that matched what we were looking for. We reviewed them all and narrowed it down to 8, and then to 3 who we eventually interviewed and called their references. All the reference check calls were recorded so every member of the committee could listen and consider the candidates thoughtfully. The challenge at this point was deciding who we felt was best positioned to meet the needs expressed in the survey and who we thought could help us lead the church into the future. This was a difficult decision and not one that anyone on the committee took lightly. In the end we decided to recommend Rev. J. Ryan Larkin to the session for approval.

# Below is a rough timeline of how this past year has played out:

#### Dec 2018 - Jan 2019

- Pastoral Search Committee formed, initial meeting
- Brainstormed, created, and distributed survey to the congregation

#### Feb 2019 - Mar 2019

- Collected and summarized survey results
- Reviewed initial steps and process with Rev. Martin McGeachy of Hudson River Presbytery
- Completed draft of Ministry Information Form (MIF) based on survey results, sent to Session and Presbytery to sign off on

#### Apr 2019 - Jun 2019

- Updated and finalized MIF based on feedback from Session and Presbytery
- Uploaded final MIF online to Church Leadership Connection System

## Jul 2019 - Aug 2019

- Reviewed Personal Information Forms (which are much more detailed than a simple resume) that were referred to us from Presbytery based on our MIF posting
- Total of 20 candidates reviewed
- Narrowed it down to 8 who were contacted and encouraged to review our MIF and apply for the position.

# Sep 2019 - Oct 2019

Narrowed it down further to 3 candidates who were interviewed, reference checked, etc.

#### Nov 2019 - Dec 2019

- Coordinated and attended a "Neutral Pulpit" with final candidate to meet in person and hear a worship service conducted at Smithfield Presbyterian Church in Amenia
- Final candidate recommended to Session for vote
- Final candidate background checked and interviewed with Presbytery for clearance.
- Final selection announced to Congregation on Dec. 22, 2019.

# Welcome our new Pastor: J. Ryan Larkin, who will be joining us in worship on Sunday, Jan. 26, 2020.

#### Hello Church!

I was told some of you are interested in a preview of the mysterious one who will soon join you (Jan. 26 in worship). I am not a fan of speaking of myself, yet this does give me a first chance to point you toward the mountain of gratitude deserved by your elected Pastor Nominating Committee. What generous, thoughtful, capable, and hospitable people they are to me. I assure you I would say the same if God had not called us to be together. Many have asked me about the place I am going, and because of their loving work, I mostly highlight the beauty and hospitality I have begun to know in and through Pine Plains.

Now, if I am to give you a few words of my backstory, I ask you to take it as a model for the ways you will tell me your own stories. We must make this an exchange, as I am so much more interested in you. My favorite name to be called is Uncle. For 16 years now, I have had my Eli and almost nine years ago Ella joined us. They taught me some of what children need to know in order to feel loved. I am very glad when I get to know children, pointing them to God's love and assuring them they have my love and help, too. That extends to all stages of life, including some extra special times when I got to know folks through ministries serving students of every stage of formal education.

I have been asking questions of a great cloud of witnesses I call friends and mentors. I have been daydreaming about all we can do together as the church. I need you to start making new paths, as always, to join in our work together. The world needs God and God's people active in peace-making and justice-making. I know you already are active in these ways. I am coming near, to help create worship and learning that empowers, and equip you saints for all that God is calling us to be and do. I am full of joy and full of hope. I pray you have joy and hope and that we can keep finding more together. Invite some folks to come introduce themselves to me and the rest of your church, as soon as January 26th. I am praying with and for you all on this journey. Please always pray with and for me. Please help me find lots of space for you to share your stories.
